IS IT AN UNREASONABLE COMMAND?

As newborn babes, desire the sincere milk of the word, that ye may grow thereby" I Peter 2:2.

This verse of scripture and the four words from it that we have selected as the title of our new magazine seem especially appropriate and descriptive of its purpose; as to the class of persons addressed—"born-again" people, but those who are still young in the faith; as to subject matter—the word of God,

especially the simple things, and exhortation concerning it; and as to the object sought—spiritual growth unto

maturity.

For a good beginning, we are here faced with the question, Have you been born again? What a welcome question to those who can answer, "Yes, thank God, by His grace!" Others take it as an insult. "Be ready always to give an answer to every man that asketh you a reason for the hope that is in you" (1 Pet. 3:15). Observe the order in the context (1 Pet. 1:23 to 2:3); "being born again . . . by the word," "wherefore . . . as newborn babes. desire the sincere milk of the word." If you have not experienced the new birth, it is not to be expected that you will have an appetite for the spiritual

food provided for God's little ones. "Thou hast neither part nor lot in this matter." The "Milk of The Word" is not for you; what you need is "Faithful Words" concerning your lost condition, and salvation for sinners through the blood of Christ.

"Wherever there is a baby, there is excitement," and what eager interest older Christians take in that feeble cry, "I'm saved," especially when there has been manifest conviction of sin under the dealing of the Holy Spirit through the searching of the word. How tenderly that infant life is guarded and cared for

the Father hath bestowed upon us, that we should be called the children of God" (1 John 3:1). "I write unto you, little children, because your sins are forgiven you for His name's sake . . . I write unto you, little children, because ye have known the Father" (1 John 2:12, 13).

But if the baby never grows, and turns out to be a dwarf, our interest becomes pity and anxiety. Is there an abnormal inward condition, or is he not getting the proper nourishment? How many sad cases there are in the spiritual realm! They claim to be saved, and in many cases keep their places among God's people, but they are not growing. They know little more of God and His word and ways than when they first professed faith in Christ.

Growth, the evidence of normal life, is lacking.

A servant of the Lord, after a long absence, met a man who had been saved during his meetings. He inquired as to his spiritual welfare, and received the answer, "Well, I can say, 'Being justified by faith, we have peace with God'". "Why, man," he replied, "you could say that five years ago". How about the present reader? Do you wish to remain a babe, or would you not rather be like Ezra, who "prepared his heart to seek the law of the Lord, and to do it, and (when established himself) to teach in Israel statutes and judgments" (Ezra 7:10).

In the first love of Christ, the heart desires to please Him; he that has done otherwise is disappointed and unhappy; and it is to both of these that this word comes, "Desire the sincere milk of the word, that ye may grow thereby".

It is a command, and a rather unusual one, for it means, practically, "Have an appetite for the sincere milk of the word". It is not, "Take this," but "Want this!" Is it unreasonable? A mother may say to her child at the table, "Eat your dinner," but she may say to him, earlier in the day, "See that you come to dinner with an appetite!" She knows that he may spoil it by eating candy between meals, and he understands her command.

A normal appetite is one of the chief elements in health. There is nothing much more important to the young believer, or older Christian, than a real enjoyment of Bible reading and the capacity to take it in to become a part of his spiritual being. But it is easily spoiled by feeding on the literary sweets of the world, its spicy fiction and comics, and sensational news features. The newspaper may demand a very few minutes of a Christian's time, but whatsoever is more than this cometh of evil. Leisure time is all too precious these days to waste on reading matter or radio programs that only minister to the flesh. Let us be "redeeming the time, because the days are evil" (Eph. 5:16). Let us take time, indeed make time if necessary, to feed on the word of God; and then there are so many profitable books that minister Christ and the word, that it is a pity to rob oneself of the "best" by spending time on the "fairly-good" or worse.

Our God, as an all-wise Creator, has provided food of the proper elements and qualities to nourish our bodies and, in youth to cause them to grow and develop. As a loving Father, He has provided His own children with the Bible to be food for their spiritual being. As you never deny your body three meals a day, remember there can be no spiritual vigor or growth if you neglect to furnish the soul with its necessary nourishment, the word of God, frequently and regularly.

As the children grow, they are given more substantial food, and with increased capacity and stronger nourishment they develop into sturdy youth and mature manhood. "Every one that useth milk is unskilful in the word of righteousness, for he is a babe; but strong meat belongeth to them that are of full age, even those who by reason of use have their senses exercised to discern both good and evil (Heb. 5:13, 14). THE WATER SPIDER

There is an interesting creature called the water-spider, from which, I believe, we can all learn a lesson. Although it breathes air, it lives in water, as its name implies, and thus exists in an element which would be death to it, unless it obtained supplies of air from above.

How does the spider manage to live, do you ask? Well, it builds a waterproof bell-shaped house under the water, the opening pointing downwards, then it rises to the top of the water and takes in air, thus obtaining a large bubble under its body, which it takes with it beneath the water, and releases under its bell-shaped house. TURNING BACK IN BATTLE

The children of Ephraim, being armed, and carrying bows, turned back in the day of battle.—Psalm lxxviii. 9.

What particular battle is referred to is of very little moment. The important thing to notice is that there was no substantial reason why Ephraim should have turned back. They went into the fight well equipped; they were armed and provided with bows.

Nevertheless they turned back, and the event is recorded for our instruction. For are we not again and again doing this very thing, and with no better excuse than the man of Ephraim

had?

The Christian life is a prolonged conflict, an unending series of pitched battles. Let us lay this well to heart. Let none of us expect or desire an easy time. Our foe is sleepless, crafty and relentless. Only those who succumb to his wiles and permit themselves to be lulled off into a deathlike sleep can hope to avoid enduring hardness. There are lusts within, also, with which we have to wage a ceaseless warfare. It is a war in which there is no release.

But, like the children of Ephraim, we are armed, and our equipment is perfect. God's "divine power hath given unto us ALL THINGS THAT PERTAIN UNTO LIFE AND GOD-LINESS" (2 Peter i. 3). It is not only that we are blessed with all spiritual blessings in heavenly places in Christ, but all things that are necessary for a godly life in this world have been pro-

vided for us. Let us think of what some of these are.

I.

We have the RIGHT OF ACCESS TO GOD IN PRAYER. This is really a most remarkable thing. When the early Caesars reigned it meant death to a slave to enter the presence of his master unbidden, or to speak to him unless commanded to do so. Under Persian rule, not even the king's consort dared to approach him except by his express permission. The story of Esther, in the fourth chapter of the book that bears her name, illustrates this. "So will I go in unto the king," she says, "and if I perish, I perish."

But we, sinners of the Gentiles, have the astounding privilege

of being able to enter the presence of God at any time and call Him Father! We may tell Him of our sins, our defeats, our disappointments, our difficulties, our trials, and be assured of His loving sympathy. We may ask Him for His powerful help, knowing that it will not be denied.

II.

We have the HOLY SCRIPTURES to teach, comfort, encourage and correct us. Therein we find sin exposed in such a way that we are helped to turn from it. Goodness and right-eousness are made attractive, so that we may pursue them. Moreover, the Scriptures continually remind us of Christ, and we are greatly stimulated in the way of well-doing when we remember how He died for love of us; how He bore our sins and suffered untold anguish for our sakes; how He lives for us today, to befriend and support us, to be our Defence against the foe and our Help in times of stress. All this, as it comes before our souls, has a cleansing effect upon us, and stirs us up to gratitude which we seek to express in life and action.

III.

We have the HOLY SPIRIT dwelling within us. He maintains us in opposition to "the flesh" with its lusts (Galatians v. 16-26) and produces in us fruit for God's glory. He works continually to displace the old motives and desires and to replace them by motives and desires that find their mainspring and object in Christ. His aim is to form Christ in us (Gal. iv. 19), so that He may dwell in our affections and be displayed in our lives. He sheds abroad God's quenchless love in our hearts and witnesses "with our spirit" that we are His children; that is, He produces within our souls the feelings and affections that belong to that holy relationship. The things of the world are thus dwarfed for us, and victory over them is enjoyed.

IV.

Lastly, we have the boon of CHRISTIAN FELLOWSHIP. It is as true as ever, that "two are better than one, because they have good reward for their labour. For if they fall, the one will lift up his fellow; but woe to him that is alone when he falleth, for he hath not another to help him up.....and if one

prevail against him, two shall withstand him" (Ecclesiastes iv. 9-12). How greatly we are helped in our conflict with wrong by the sympathy and fellowship of godly companions! often isolation has proved to be the undoing of a Christian! For, as the preacher-king says: "How can one be warm alone?"

Equipped thus, why should there be any turning back in battle? Why should not we be "more than conquerors through Him that loved us"? Not merely conquerors, in that we overcome the foe, but MORE THAN CONQUERORS in that we gain spiritual territory and are nourished and made strong by the victories that almightiness helps us to win.

Yet there is an extreme in this, which we must guard against. To read nothing but the Bible is not a thing which could be taught to the saints. God has set in the Church teachers; and if it is right for me to hear a teacher speaking God's mind, how would it be wrong to read that teacher's words if committed to writing?

It may be argued that his words would lose their power; but you might as well say that Paul's epistles lost their power by being in writing. We must remember that God has not only given us His Word, but He has given us Evangelists, Pastors and Teachers, for the edifying of the body of Christ (Eph. chap. iv.); and, in rejecting any of these, we reject our own mercies. If one of such teachers delivers a message in the power of the Spirit to ten persons, on what principle would you prevent me writing down his message and sending it to ten thousand of the saints? Are these ten thousand to be denied the privilege of having such a message, simply because they could not be on the spot to hear it spoken?

By all means let us take heed what we read, as well as what we hear; but don't let us get into bondage by making vows which the Lord does not ask us to make, and vows, withal, which we might find it very hard to keep. —Wm. Shaw.
