Helps for Young Believers.

No, it is known that the time one hears from Big Ben is always to be trusted. And yet even Big Ben depends upon Greenwich for the correct time. Twice daily it telegraphs its time automatically to Greenwich.

If it is necessary for Big Ben to keep automically in touch with Greenwich in order that the correct time may be given, how much more is it necessary for us who are christians to be constantly in touch with the Lord Jesus if we are to be faithful representatives for Him down here.

There are those around who are taking note of us. Are we giving them a faithful testimony? Does our life and walk and conversation tell forth that we belong to Jesus?

If we neglect our daily reading of the Word and prayer it will soon show itself in our life here. Big Ben is in touch with Greenwich twice daily. Are we twice daily in touch with the source of our strength? Oh! let us see that we are constantly—not only twice daily—having to do with the Lord Jesus. He is ever ready to succour us.

Sometimes we hear of a young christian getting put out by some circumstance, and instead of going straight to the Lord and seeking His grace, he does just the opposite. No prayer! The Word of God left unread and sometimes days pass in this unhappy way. His light does not shine, his witness becomes blurred and the Lord is misrepresented here. It is just as if Big Ben was not telling the correct time. If such a one should be reading these lines, I would say to you, Return at once to the Lord and tell Him all. He will forgive and put you right, and enable you again to shine for Him. May our prayer be, "Teach me Thy way, O Lord, and lead me in a plain path, because of those which observe me." (Psa. 27. Some of God's Heroes.

This book is the work of the same prophet who preached some years ago, and who now by the command of God has made his scribe or clerk write down and read aloud to the people all the things which God had told him would happen.

Will the people listen now at last? No, once more instead of obeying the message these foolish people punish the messenger.



The Roll of Honour.

TO-DAY in nearly every school and college, somewhere in a conspicuous place hangs a Roll of Honour. All who have done anything noteworthy have their names inscribed thereon as a lasting tribute to whatever they have accomplished.

One such Roll was being discussed by some youngsters who came from a large school in the South of England. One little girl said how nice it would be to have one's name put on the Roll of Honour. "Yes," replied her companion, a small boy, "it would be nice. You see it's there for always."

That remark reminds me of another Roll, described in the Bible as the Book of Life. In this are written the names of each one who believes on the Lord Jesus Christ, who is redeemed by His precious blood, and who will spend eternity with Him.

The time will come when those names will be read out, and anyone whose name is not written there will be banished for ever from the presence of God.

Are you sure that your name is in the Book of Life? If not, accept the Lord Jesus as your Saviour while there is still opportunity. Then when the Book of Life is opened your name will not be missing.

"Come now, and let us reason together, saith the Lord: though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool." Isa. 1. 18.

Helps for Young Christians.

I was much struck by a story which was told at a gathering of lads last year. A young fellow went into the Army and during those war years, 1914 to 1918, he rose to a very great distinction and then fell just as quickly. When he got home, a disgraced and broken man, he said to his mother, "Come along here, Mother. I want to show you where I began to fall. It was by that bedside, where I used to read and pray, and when I began to give that up—I fell."

The story speaks for itself! How many have to own that the neglect of reading the Word of God and prayer have been the beginning of a path of dishonour and of no testimony to the Lord.

Have you ever noticed that word in Acts 9, concerning Saul of Tarsus, where the Lord says of him, "Behold he prayeth"? May these words be true of you, my dear young believer.

You are saved by His death and blood-shedding; yes, saved from hell and saved for glory. But while on the way homeward you are beset with snares around and sin within, and you cannot keep yourself. But there is One Who is able to keep and He would encourage us always to be dependent upon Himself. The way we express that dependence is by prayer. Tell Him everything—your joys, your sorrows, your temptations and your failings, and ask Him for that grace which you need to be kept true to Him.

"Ask the Saviour to help you, Comfort, strengthen and keep you; He is willing to aid you; He will carry you through."

A Chinese Story.

\ 7UAN was a young man who lived in far-away China. His home was at a town called Shunteh, in the North. One day a brave white missionary came to live at Shunteh, and to preach the Good Tidings of the Lord Jesus Christ to those who lived there. Yuan often stopped to listen to his preaching, and as he listened he became certain that Jesus Christ was the Saviour of the world, and one glad day went for a long talk with the white missionary, and at the end of that talk he kneeled down and gave his heart to the Lord Jesus, and took Him as his own Saviour.

From that day Yuan loved to tell others of his Saviour, and sometimes went for long journeys on his bicycle into the villages and hamlets around Shunteh, preaching and singing about the love of God. Poor Yuan was forced to walk the weary miles back to his home in Shunteh, and arrived late at night, tired and footsore, but thankful that his life had been spared him.

"As the brigands disappeared with my bicycle," said Yuan, with a smile, "I remembered that on the back of it my Bible and some Scripture portions were strapped, and at once I sent up a prayer to my

Father—God: 'O, cause these wretched bandits to read my Bible and repent of their wickedness.' "

Ten days passed slowly by, and Yuan missed both his bicycle and his Bible sorely. His preaching tours had to be done on foot now, and in consequence he could only go to the nearer villages. On the tenth day after his adventure with the brigands, Yuan arrived back in Shunteh at nightfall after visiting one of these villages, and to his surprise was met at home with an urgent request from a shopkeeper who lived in a town thirty miles away from Shunteh that Yuan would come to see him. Wonderingly, Yuan set off early the next

morning, and what was his surprise when he reached his friend to find his bicycle there—yes, and there, strapped securely on the back, was his beloved Bible! What joy filled his heart! "How did my bicycle and my Bible arrive here?" he asked, in great surprise.

Some of God's Heroes.

OD has had His heroes in all ages. This month we shall consider one who was raised up to make the truth known, at a time when men and women were kept in darkness and ignorance of God and His Word by those who claimed to be His servants.

Martin Luther was a miner's son and was born in a small town in Germany in 1483. His parents though poor were anxious for their boy to have a good education, and thus in spite of poverty and hardships the lad persevered with his studies, and at the age of eighteen entered the University of Erfurt to study law as his father wished. He proved himself a brilliant student; took his degrees and started to give public lectures in philosophy.

Two things, however, turned Luther's thoughts in quite a different

direction. One was the very sudden death of his bosom friend, which brought the uncertainty of life vividly before him; the other was the finding of a Bible in the University library.

He had never seen a Bible before, and his surprise was great as he read it, and learned how dark and ignorant of God his mind was, in spite of all his learning. As he continued to read he became quite troubled about his sins. Once in a moment of deep distress he had vowed to devote his life to God. Perhaps if he did so now and entered a monastery he would get peace.

So next we find Martin Luther, the brilliant student and lecturer, in the Augustine monastery at Erfurt, where he is a monk of the lowest grade who cleans the cells and sweeps out the chapel. It matters not to him how mean the duties if only he can find that peace of mind and conscience which he is seeking. Peace, however, is not found in that way, and neither the drudgery nor the self-inflicted penances brought Luther any relief.

At length, worn out with fastings and penances and distress of mind, he became ill. Then it was that light broke in upon him. He was repeating as he had often done before, "I believe in the forgiveness of sins," when an old monk who was with him, said, "Nay, you are to believe not only in the forgiveness of David's sins and Peter's sins, you must believe in the forgiveness of your own sins." It was a message from God. Luther's eyes were opened and he saw that through Christ he had forgiveness and salvation.


Soon the opportunity was given him to make known to others the truth which had brought such comfort to his own soul, and both in the University and in the parish church of Wittemberg he preached forgiveness through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Crowds flocked to hear him. It was such strange wonderful news to those dark hearts, and many hearing him received the message and were filled with joy.

Luther himself had still much to learn. He went to Rome believing it to be a very holy city, and still thinking to gain merit for himself by visiting the so-called holy places. He was shocked, however, at what he saw there. The priests led such wicked lives and joked at the most holy things. Luther turned away from them in horror. Then one day as he was laboriously climbing up the "holy" stairs in the Church of the Lateran on his knees, as others did, to merit the promised fifteen years' pardon of sins, he suddenly seemed to hear a voice saying to him "The just shall live by faith.

In amazement Luther started to his feet. He saw all at once how foolish it is to try and earn what God gives so freely to those who simply put their trust in the Lord Jesus. Descending those stairs, no longer in the chains of superstition, he returned home, determined henceforth to rest alone on the work of Christ for justification, and to preach this truth to others.

If the Lord will, we shall hope to see next month, how God was now going to use His servant.

Gold was used for a great many things in the Tabernacle such as the ark and the golden altar, and in the Temple everything was of gold, all speaking to us of Christ and His worth. There is a little verse which savs :--

"As within the temple olden, Was there seen no costly stone. All was cedar, carved and golden, Naught but Christ, and Christ alone."

Silver is often mentioned in connection with the children of Israel and God uses it to teach us important lessons. Silver is the price of redemption. But we know that silver can never redeem our souls and make us fit for God. If it could, the Lord Jesus would not have needed to die, but only His precious blood could meet our need and redeem us from the power of Satan. So Paul, writing to the Corinthians, says "Ye are not your own, for ye are bought with a price." But we who are saved, belong to One Who loves us and our song in heaven will be "to Him that loved us and washed us from our sins in His own blood."

Will that song be yours? I trust it will and that even now you will learn the value of that precious blood.

"Willingly," was the reply, and glad of the opportunity he started off with "My dear children" and related to these gentlemen, as simply and earnestly as if he were speaking to the children, the story of David and Goliath, and how the young shepherd lad by faith in God slew the giant Goliath with a sling and stone.

When he had finished a murmur of satisfaction passed round the gathering, and then one of the gentlemen of the council said "Well done. You are David and we Goliath and you have slain us all. Go and continue your Sunday School, and we willingly give you the use of the Day Schools for it."

Thus God ordered for His servant. His enemies were confounded and the work of the Sunday School has continued to prosper up to this day, though this dear man himself is now with the Lord.

Some of God's Heroes.

WE saw last month how Martin Luther learned that the only way to be forgiven and justified is not by working for salvation but by simply resting on what the Lord Jesus has done.

Imagine his feelings then when a monk was sent round by the pope to sell indulgences, which he said would insure forgiveness of sins to any who bought them. No matter whether the sins were past or present or even future they would be forgiven to those who bought indulgences. People too might buy pardons for those who were already dead and their souls would go straight to heaven. What a delusion of the devil! Yet to many it was a tempting offer and they flocked to buy, so that already the pope saw his coffers beginning to fill with money as he desired.

Luther could not bear to see the simple people taken in by such falsehoods, and he boldly told them that such indulgences could never save them and they must go to the Lord Jesus for forgiveness. The pope's agent was of course very angry at this, but he became more angry still when one morning Luther nailed up on the door of the church at Wittemberg his "Theses," a paper telling the truth about indulgences and showing the contrast between this pretended forgiveness bought for money and God's free salvation. These Theses were printed and circulated not only in Germany but in other countries too and they caused a great stir in

Europe. To many a dark heart they were the means of bringing joy and peace and freedom from the slavery and darkness of the superstitions of Rome.

You can just imagine the wrath of the pope and priests at these happenings. Many people no longer valued the false indulgences. What was to be done? Luther was summoned to Rome to answer for his deeds but he was wisely advised not to go. Then the pope issued a bill of excommunication against Luther by which he was declared to be put out of the church and cut off from hope of heaven. Ah! Luther knew his hope of heaven was certain, for it was not in the hands of the pope but made sure to him by the Lord Jesus, so he was unmoved by the announcement, and with the men of Wittemberg he burned the paper publicly outside the city.

The pope's next step was to try and get the Emperor of Germany and the princes to take up the matter against Luther. It was decided to summon him to appear before the Emperor at Worms where there was to be a great meeting of princes, dukes, archbishops, bishops and all the nobles of the land. Luther's friends were afraid to let him go lest he should never be allowed to return, but Luther was decided. He felt the Lord would have him go to be His witness before that grand assembly of the great ones of the earth, so he went.


Pointing to a pile of books on the table they asked him, first, if he acknowledged he had written them, and secondly whether he was prepared to retract or take back what he had

written. Luther owned that the books were his, but asked for time to consider his answer to the second question as it was so important. He was told he could retire and appear again next day. Meantime Luther spent the time seeking the help and wisdom and strength he so much needed from the only One who could enable him to stand firm at such a moment. He spent the night in earnest prayer, feeling his own great weakness, yet realising that God had chosen him to be His witness to the truth.

Next day he returned to the councilhall, and we are told that as he made his defence he spoke with such solemnity and authority that it seemed as though he were the judge and his judges the accused. Then to the question "Will you or will you not retract?" he answered "I cannot and will not retract for it is not safe for a christian to speak against his conscience. Here I stand. I can do no other. God help me. Amen."

The decisive word was spoken for which thousands of people in Europe were waiting, to throw off the fetters of the church of Rome. Had Luther yielded we might never have had an open Bible. We might still be enchained in all the darkness of superstition and priestcraft, to which alas! so many today are returning, forgetful of the truths which their ancestors maintained often at great cost.

That declaration might have cost Luther his life. His enemies were fierce and many, and wanted to kill him. God, however, undertook for His servant and it was not enemies but friends who captured him on his return journey and took him in safety to the

castle of the Wartburg. Here in quietness and seclusion Luther was able to devote himself to the translation of the Bible into German, and thus gave to the common people the Word of God which had brought such light and liberty to his own soul.

Of this latter you will be interested I am sure. The owner's initials in gold were on the outside of the cover in the centre, then at the top were the words


SAVED BY GRACE



GOD'S HANDYMAN.

A Pilot who could not be trusted.

→HOSE who have cruised through the beautiful blue waters of the Mediterranean during the summer time have experienced how wonderful the views are from Marseilles to Monte Carlo. All the places of interest can be reached by means of pleasure steamers. But what a great difference it is in winter time to put to sea in a craft which is not capable of battling against the terrific

mistrals, as the cold north-west winds are called, which one encounters during this part of the year, in this vicinity.

Our ship was put to the test in a strong mistral which lasted a good many hours. Usually the mistral lasts for three days. After leaving England we made our way to Marseilles, where we arrived safely. Our next place to


call was Antibes, near Cannes, and not knowing the coast sufficiently well, the owner decided to take a pilot.

He gave orders to leave the next morning, weather permitting. Accordingly, as the weather seemed very fair, with only a little swell, we cast off at 4 a.m. After being at sea for about two hours the wind freshened and as soon as day dawned we could see it

was looking very clear ahead, which is a sure sign of the mistral.

At 10 o'clock the seas were mountainous and the waves were coming over the bridge. We found to our dismay that the pilot had not taken a course, but was going by guess work, and he was a long way out in his reckoning.

Seeing the position he had put us in, I called the captain, who thinking the



pilot was capable of managing the ship, had gone below for a little sleep. I explained the case to him, and he immediately looked up the chart, and found out we were five miles from Port Going on deck he took charge, and after an hour's steaming at half speed we reached our destination. It was a haven of rest to us and we moored to a buoy for the night.

Have you ever pictured yourself on the sea of life without a chart or a compass to guide you? The pilot I have told you of could not be trusted, and we cannot say what the result might have been if our captain had been unable to take control. Let me tell you of the only Pilot Who can safely guide us to the heavenly shore. Perhaps you know the chorus—

"Do you want a Pilot?
Signal then to Jesus.
Do you want a Pilot?
Bid Him come on board.
For He will safely guide
Across the ocean wide,
Until we reach at last
The heavenly harbour."

If you trust the Lord Jesus He will bring you safely through all the trials of this world. His Word is our chart, and in it we are told, "Behold the Lord's hand is not shortened that it cannot save, neither His ear heavy that it cannot hear" (Isa. 59. I). And in Heb. 7. 35 we read "He is able also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by Him." Will you accept Him now? He will never fail anyone who trusts Him.

Some of God's Heroes.

OD'S heroes are always persons who believe God and know He means what He says, even when others doubt His Word. We have a lovely example of this in Caleb.

The children of Israel, you remember, were slaves in Egypt, but God had said He would bring them out and take them to a land "flowing with

milk and honey." Did God mean what He said? Of course He did, and when our story opens He had already done wonderful things for this people of Israel. He had brought them out from the slavery of Egypt. He had made a way for them through the Red Sea and destroyed their enemies. He had fed them in a miraculous way with bread from heaven. He had taken them across the desert and now they had arrived at the very borders of the promised land. All they had to do was to go forward and possess it.

We find, however, from the first chapter of Deuteronomy that the people did not really trust God to do what He had said He would. They decide to send men to search the land and report on it instead of obeying God's command to go forward and take it. So God lets them have their way, and twelve men are chosen (one from each tribe) to go and spy out the land.

After forty days they return bringing with them a sample of the fruit of the land. And what a sample! The bunch of grapes they bring from the valley of Eshcol is so large that it has to be hung from a pole and carried by two men. "Yes it is certainly a good land, rich as God has said, but . . . (ah! that "but", Satan loves to suggest it to men's minds) . . . but the people of the land are strong, they live in walled cities and there are giants among them. We cannot go up against them for they are stronger than we."

Thus speak ten of the twelve men and as they utter these words the

hearts of the people begin to quake for fear. But hark! another voice is heard. It is Caleb who speaks up. He too has seen the land and the walled cities and the giants, but Caleb brings God into his reckoning. " Let us go up at once and possess it " he says " for we are well able to overcome it."

If only the people had listened to Caleb how much better it would have been for them. They pay attention instead to the words of the ten men who give a false report of the land, and discourage the people so that they talk of returning to Egypt. In vain Caleb and his companion Joshua plead with them, reminding them that God is with them and that there is no need for fear, for the God Who has promised will certainly bring them in to this good land. These words only call forth the people's anger and they threaten to stone Caleb and Joshua, God's true servants.

The result is that God does not allow these murmuring, unbelieving people to enter the land. He says they must turn and wander in the desert for forty years till only their children are left. "Your little ones which ye said should be a prey, them will I bring in and they shall know the land which ye have despised." That was God's solemn judgment on the people's unbelief.

God, however, does not forget His faithful servant Caleb, and He says "To him will I give the land that he hath trodden upon and to his children because he hath wholly followed the Lord." So when, after forty years in the wilderness, the children of Israel are taking possession of the land, Caleb comes forward to claim his portion, for "the Lord" says he "hath kept me alive, as He said" and "I am as strong this day as I was in the day that Moses sent me."

Yes, God is faithful. Shame on us that we so often doubt His promises. May you and I, dear reader, seek more to hold fast His Word even when others around us are doubting and denying it, and may we take encouragement from His promise "Them that honour Me I will honour."





A Sailor's Chart.

HAVE you ever seen a sailor's chart? Of course you know a chart is a special kind of map showing the coast, with rocks, banks and channels clearly marked. This tells a captain of a ship which way to steer when nearing a harbour.

You see there is a proper way to come into a harbour, and unless a ship comes just the right way she may strike upon rocks or sandbanks and get wrecked. I saw a ship not long ago that was wrecked because the captain thought he knew just where to go and was just a little bit wrong. So I am sure you will agree that it would be very silly of a captain not to look often at his chart, and not to follow its directions.

Now you and I are on a voyage—we know we shall not stay in this world for ever. Where are we bound for? "Oh" you say, "I want to go to heaven." Well, are you sure of the way? It won't do to try to get there our own way. We want to be sure.

Perhaps you will say "How can I be sure?" Just like the ship's captain—by studying your "chart". God has written down in His Word, the Bible, everything that we have to know about the way to heaven. There we may read just why we are not fit for God's bright home, because we are sinners and God cannot have sin in heaven. Then He tells us He has made a way for us to come.

Very often before big ships can come into a harbour, a lot of work has to be done in digging out or dredging the entrance, and this is very hard and very costly work. So before any boy or girl could be saved the Lord Jesus, God's dear Son, had to make the way. And the way He made that poor sinners like us might go to His beautiful home was the most costly that could ever be thought of. IT COST JESUS HIS LIFE. He DIED at Calvary, on the cross, to make atonement for our sins. You know the hymn,

"We may not know, we cannot tell
What pains He had to bear,
But we believe it was for us
He hung and suffered there."

Boys and girls, if you only really thought of all that it meant to the Lord Jesus—that awful cross, the judgment He bore, and dying there for sins—you would surely come to Him at once and thank Him with all your heart for what He has done for you.

So although we are all sinners and could never be allowed to enter heaven, "Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners", and the pain, and the sorrow, and the death He bore have made a way for us, that our sins might be forgiven and that we might be fit for God's presence.

Now He tells us "I am the way.... no man cometh unto the Father but by Me" (John 14. 6). That is, it must be through believing in Him and His work. You see, He says "I am the way," not "a" way, as though there were many ways to be saved. "The" way means that there is only ONE, and that one so wonderful, so great.

God's love to us was so great that "He spared not His own Son" for us, and so that there might be no mistake, He has written it all down for us in

the Bible—our "Chart". Boys and girls, won't you read it, believe it, and do what it says? "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and THOU SHALT BE SAVED." (Acts 16. 31.)

Some of God's Heroes.

OD has His heroes even in these days and I should like to tell you this month about one who is living to-day in India. He belongs to a well-to-do Mohammedan family, is well-educated and as a young man had his own private motor car. He had a good home and a devoted mother whom he loved very much and who loved him dearly.

One day as he was driving along in his car in Madras he heard someone speaking in the open air. The words which caught his ear were these: "For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul?" Mark 8. 36, 37. He was arrested, stopped his car, and going up to the speaker, he asked where those words came from. The missionary showed him a Bible and told him the words were in it, so the young fellow said he would like to buy the Book and produced a ten rupee note to pay for it. The missionary remembered he had a Bible given him to give away so he gave it to the young Mohammedan who drove off.

When he got home he started to read his new Book secretly, and as he read it his heart was opened to the truth and he found salvation through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. So great was his joy that he took the Book to his mother telling her what had happened. To his amazement and sorrow she merely glanced at the Book then threw it on the fire and became very angry with her son. Henceforth her love for him which had been so great changed to bitter hatred. All his friends turned against him and he was driven from his home.

Then one day he received a message from his mother inviting him to come and have a meal with her. Only too pleased to return to his mother whom he still loved very much, he accepted the invitation and went. What do you think that mother set before her own boy? She had prepared some fish curry and in it she had put chopped cobra to poison him. He had only eaten a mouthful or two when his throat began to burn, and picking up his plate he rushed out into the street, and exclaiming "I'm poisoned," he fell down at a policeman's feet. was taken to hospital where for many weeks he lay very ill.

He did recover at last but of course he could not go back home again. All his relatives knew he was a Christian. Our young friend did not hide his light though it brought much persecution upon him. He even dropped his own Mohammedan name and adopted the name of Paul and, like the Paul of the Bible, he has suffered much for Christ's sake. Many attempts have been made to kill him.

Once he went to sea as a common sailor. Even there most of the sailors were Mohammedans and were very unkind to him, because he was a

Christian. One night when in port a number of them went ashore and got very drunk. Coming back very late they decided they would kill Paul in his berth. Now it so happened that he had exchanged berths with another sailor so as to be able to see better to read his Bible. So when the drunken sailors came in with their knives to kill him it was another poor sailor who received their blows and cuts and who was dreadfully mutilated. Thus was Paul miraculously delivered.

He is still alive and though unable to live near his former home he is seeking to work for his Lord in another part of India. Since his own mother burned his first Bible which brought such light and joy to his heart, twenty-five more have been taken from him, and he is now treasuring his twenty-seventh and using it to make known God's Word to others. God has used him and is using him and he has had the joy of leading some other Mohammedans to put their trust in the Lord Jesus.

God Answers Prayer.

A GREAT part of Northern Ontario is thick bush country broken for many miles by deep silent lakes. Here and there in clearings by the lake shores are the lonely homes of the settlers, while stretching for miles beyond the scattered homesteads lies the thick bush where countless trees grow closely together or fall and rot on the moss covered rocks. So dense is this bush growth that it is very easy to lose one's way in it, and even the

settlers themselves occasionally get "turned round" as they say.

One afternoon a mother and her daughter Lily went into the bush behind their home to gather some of the wild berries which grow there so freely in the swampy parts. Filling their baskets and enjoying the cool shades of the trees (for it was a hot afternoon of a Canadian summer) they wandered on and on, forgetting the time and not noticing that they had got off the trail they had followed at first.

As evening came on, imagine their dismay when they realised they were lost and a long way from their home. They could find no signs of a trail anywhere near them. How unhappy they felt as they searched in vain around for some sign of a path. Evening wore on and still they struggled among the bushes trying to find their way home.

Poor Lily began to think of the fierce wild animals that haunted the bush, for at times a bear or a wolf had been seen near the settlers' homes. Lily's mother kept her fears to herself and did all she could to cheer her tired and weary child. Night was coming on and their clothes were torn with the rough bushes. Their feet and ankles ached with scrambling over the rocks that seemed everywhere. They had no lantern and they were both tired and hungry.

With the setting sun the bush was soon in darkness and the mother wondered whether they would have to sleep under the bushes for the night, but in her extremity she said, "There is only one thing we can do now, Lily.

We must just tell God that we are lost and unable to find our way home and ask Him to help us."


There and then the two knelt down in the bush and earnestly prayed that God their heavenly Father would watch over them and direct them home safely. The mother felt calm and peaceful, trusting that her prayer would be answered fully.

Continuing their way between the trees they listened hard for any sounds that might help them. What was that faint tinkling sound in the distance? It was only the sound of the cow-bells far away, as the animals were returning to their scanty living in the bush after their late milking, but how welcome it sounded! How eager they were to follow the sound,

and soon they saw a lantern moving among the trees. Before long they were found by friends who had come in search of them.

Helps for Young Believers.

I was at a meeting recently when these verses were read, "Ye see your calling, brethren, how that not many wise men after the flesh, not many mighty, not many noble, are called; but God hath chosen the foolish things of the world to confound the wise; and God hath chosen the weak things of the world to confound the things which are mighty; and base things of the world, and things which are despised, hath God chosen, yea, and things which are not, to bring to nought things that are: that no flesh should glory in His presence." As I looked around that meeting I could see one who is a road sweeper, another a doctor, an office clerk, a

lorry driver, another who is on the railway, a public schoolboy and a bank clerk, but each one could rejoice that he was one of God's chosen ones.

What are you, my dear young believer? Possibly unknown by the world, not thought much of—indeed a "weak" one might just describe you. Yet He selects the weak ones whom He can change into His mighty ones. What grace this is!

"Hath not God chosen the poor of this world, rich in faith, and heirs of the kingdom which He hath promised to them that love Him?" James 2. 5.

O good Shepherd, love so deep, Came to earth to seek Thy sheep, Searched in city, village, mart: Grief and sorrow wrung Thy heart.



A Sailor's Chart.

O you remember last month we had a talk about a sailor's chart, and how it reminds us of the guide God has given to show us the way to be saved?

If you were to look carefully at the chart of any port, you would find clearly marked on it the right way to go in. But you would also find that the dangerous places, the shallow waters and the hidden rocks would be marked too. What are these for? "Why" you say, "so that the sailor shall steer clear of them, of course." And so in His Word—the Bible—God has marked the "rocks"—the dangerous thoughts and actions by which boys and girls (and men and women too) get their souls wrecked for ever.

If you turn to Acts, chapter 24, verse 25, you will find a very bad "rock" on which ever so many people have been lost. And that too, people who really intended to be saved—some day. We read there of a man who "put off" his salvation.

So boys and girls who may know all about God's loving message and who fully intend to be saved some day, will say "I'm not old enough to bother about these things yet. When I've left school I'll think about them." And how sad it is to know that in many many cases they leave it till Too Late, and are Lost.

I read a story once about a young officer who always used to "put it off." In fact when he was a boy his mother used to call him "Mr. Ten Minutes." For he would so often say, "Oh, let me have ten minutes

more." When he grew up he was an officer in the Zulu war, and with a few of his men was sent to find a camping ground for the army. After finishing their work they were told by a friendly native that a Zulu had been seen near the place. The young officer suggested that they should let their horses graze another ten minutes and then start back again. But while they waited a band of fierce Zulus came upon them, and although his men escaped, the young officer was killed. How dreadful! Yes, but it just came of "putting off."

And if it is so foolish in every day things to get the habit of putting off, how much more foolish it is to put off your soul's salvation. God's Word says (2 Cor. 6. 2) "Now is the day of salvation."

"Come now, and do not longer stay;
Soon judgment storms will roll.
Oh Come, for Jesus says you may,
AND TRUST HIM WITH YOUR SOUL."

How good it is of God to mark this great danger in His Word. I do trust every boy or girl who reads this, will steer clear of the rock "putting off" and believe Now on the Lord Jesus Christ and be saved.

God's Hammer.

I THINK I can hear someone say, "Why, I never heard of God having a hammer. Is it really in the Bible?" Now if you will look in Jeremiah 23. 29, you will see where I got it from. "Is not My Word like... a hammer that breaketh the rock in pieces?" So the hammer I am thinking of is God's Word, and the rock I think must represent men's hard hearts, hardened in sin and against God. Let me tell you what God's Word is able to do.

Some years ago a Jewish boy of about seventeen, named Henry Stern, was walking about the streets of London, looking very lonely and unhappy. He had left his home in far off Germany, full of hope, to take a good appointment which had been promised to him, only to find on his arrival that it had all fallen through. And now he was alone, workless, in a strange city.

But God's eye sees everyone! God wanted Henry—in fact He had led him all the way, though he did not know this. In the midst of his trouble a young fellow lodger asked Henry to go with him to a Gospel service. (Christian friend, have you ever done that to a companion?)

Henry liked it very much, but of course to hear that Jesus was the Son of God was quite opposed to his Jewish ideas! But still he went again and again. And then he bought a New Testament—a book to be avoided by any strict Jew! But Henry said, "If I get no good from it, it can do me no harm."

So he began to read for the first time

the story of Jesus, Who died to save us from our sins. And he read on and on. Very soon "God's Hammer" was doing its work and was breaking to pieces the hard unbelief of Henry's heart. There was a big struggle, because for a Jew to become a Christian in those days, meant being disowned by his parents.

But Christ conquered! I wish I could tell you the thrilling adventures, and sufferings for Jesus, he went through later, for he became a missionary to his own people in Arabia. His name is well-known even today.

But there may be some boy or girl reading this, whose heart is hard, who is inclined to think of the Bible as being "quite an antiquated book" and who does not want God. Now, I am obliged to tell you this, because it is true, that "God's Hammer" has another use—God's Word will come down in judgment one day upon all who persist in unbelief—for "Whosoever shall be ashamed of ME and My words, of him shall the Son of Man be ashamed." (Luke 9. 26.) That is a very awful thought, but it is God's Word, which is TRUTH.

Boys and girls, what are you doing with God's wonderful Word, which is able to make you "wise unto salvation"? Will you let it speak to you, as it did to young Henry Stern?

ANY years ago there was a great king who reigned in Babylon.
Because of the sins of His people Israel God allowed this king Nebu-

chadnezzar to besiege Jerusalem and take it. He captured many prisoners and carried them off to Babylon.

Amongst the captives was a young man called Daniel who knew and trusted in the true God, and he decided that although he was a captive of the King of Babylon yet God had the first claim upon his life and obedience. Even in the matter of food Daniel took a firm stand and refused to eat and drink that which he knew to be contrary to the mind of God. It seemed a small matter but it is in the small things we can show our obedience, and God honoured His servant and gave him favour with the kings of Babylon so that he was appointed to a high position in the kingdom.

The position of favour which Daniel enjoyed under the Persian king Darius who had captured the kingdom, aroused the envy of some of the princes. They could not find any fault with his life or the way he did the king's business. At last they thought of a plan to ruin Daniel and even get him out of the way altogether.

They asked the king to sign a decree saying that anyone who made a prayer to God or man otherwise than to the king for thirty days should be cast into the den of lions. They knew that Daniel prayed to God every day and they thought now they should have him. The king not knowing that the decree was against Daniel signed it.

Well, Daniel heard about it, and do you think he was afraid and went and hid in a cupboard to pray or perhaps left off altogether? How many a young christian has been afraid to kneel down or even to shut his eyes and give thanks for food in front of unsaved companions—and no den of lions to fear either! But how different it was with Daniel.

We are told that when he knew that the writing was signed he went into his house and with his room windows open he kneeled down three times a day and prayed, and gave thanks to his God as he did before. I like that, don't you?

His enemies found him praying of course and they went and told the king, and insisted that Daniel should be thrown to the lions. The king would fain have saved his faithful servant. He had learned something of his worth no doubt, but more, through Daniel's life or lips he had learned something of Daniel's God, for as God's servant was thrown into the den of lions the king sought to comfort him saying, "Thy God Whom thou servest continually, He will deliver thee."

It was a lovely testimony from heathen lips and Daniel knew it was true and could rest in his God.

The king went to his palace but could not sleep. The early morning found him again at the entrance to the lion's den, this time asking anxiously "O Daniel, is thy God able to deliver thee?"

How glad he was to find Daniel alive and to hear how God had shut the lions' mouths so that they had not hurt His servant "because he believed in his God."

The Shepherd and the Sheep.

BEING a "Cockney" born and reared within the sound of Bow Bells I knew nothing of life on a farm, but while on a visit in the country found the following scene most interesting.

A lot of lambs and sheep were being led along a narrow lane. Suddenly one of the number skipped away from the others, and ran ahead as fast as it could. The watchful eye of the shepherd saw it scampering off. He whistled a faithful dog, trotting by his side, which immediately bounded after the runaway, got ahead of it, and standing in front of the lamb brought it to a sudden halt and looked at



its master. The shepherd whistled again. The dog then barked at the lamb as if to say "Go back," and the lamb fled back to the flock.

How this reminded me of Jesus, the good Shepherd, Who gave His life for the sheep. His eye is ever watching His own and He sees at once if one goes astray.

I noticed then that the whole flock went through a gateway into an enclosure and the gate was shut. This is another lesson for us, reminding us that Jesus our Shepherd sees that each lamb and sheep is safely enclosed. He says, "My sheep hear My voice and I know them and they follow Me: and I give unto them eternal life; and they shall never perish, neither shall any man pluck them out of My hand." (John 10, 27, 28.)

The scene became more interesting. The shepherd took one of the number, turned it over on its back, then he sheared it, removing the wool. Not a bleat was heard from the lamb, but quiet submission in the hands of the man. Do you remember the scripture that tells us "As a lamb before her shearers is dumb so opened He not His mouth"? (Acts 8. 32). This speaks of Jesus, how He submitted to everything—a Lamb indeed, God's Lamb. His blood was shed to purchase you. Do you believe that the price He paid to God was for you? If you do, then you belong to Him, the good Shepherd, and you can drink of the waters and eat of the green pastures as led by His watchful eye. And like David of old, you will be able to say—

"THE LORD IS MY SHEPHERD, I SHALL NOT WANT."



Will you boys and girls who have trusted the Lord Jesus try to confess Him? You've no idea the strength and happiness it gives you. But we know that better than all besides is the joy it gives our precious Saviour Who loved us and gave Himself for us.

A Sailor's Chart.

RE you tired of our talks about charts? No? Well, shall we have just one more? You will remember last month we spoke of the dreadfully dangerous rock called "putting off," and how many wrecks (not ships, but boys and girls, and men and women) there have been on it.

This time, turn to Acts 26. 28. Here is a man who is one of God's warnings. His name was King Agrippa, but his name on God's chart is "Almost." He was almost a christian—but Not Quite. He knew all about the Gospel and a lot about the christians, but he had never really come for himself to Jesus.

I think this is a warning on God's chart to those boys and girls who know all about the way to be saved, and still are not saved. You often find them in Sunday Schools and Children's Meetings. They like to read little books like this; they can answer all sorts of questions and recite lots of verses. But if you asked them, "Have you given your heart to Jesus?" they would not be able to say "Yes." They are "Almost" but not "Altogether" christians.

I am sure you will see the difference. I very badly wanted to get to Birmingham once. So I went in haste to the station and very nearly caught the train. But just as I ran into the station the train steamed out. So near—but not on the train. It is true I did get to Birmingham by another train some hours later, but suppose there was never to be another train, then I could NEVER have reached there.

Now there is no other Saviour but Jesus, and no other way to be saved but really trusting in Him. It won't do just to know about it, you must make it your own, by believing in the Lord Jesus Christ for yourself. Please, please steer clear of that dangerous "Almost" rock.

But rocks are marked only to be avoided. Just look at another man who is in the right way. In Acts 16. 31, we read of one who was so anxious to be saved that he cried out loud, "What MUST I do to be saved?" Listen to the answer he got. "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and THOU SHALT BE SAVED".

Did he listen to this answer and did he obey it? Indeed he did. He didn't say "I'll see about it next week." Nor was he an "almost" man. He did then and there accept the message. "He believed in God with all his house." What a happy home that must have been, where all the family were real "altogether" christians.

Will you too take the Lord Jesus Christ now as your own Saviour?



Several ships picked up the message, but the nearest one with a doctor on just what to do for him, and asking for a report again in a few hours. Day by day for a whole week the two ships kept in touch by wireless.

Morning and evening before he had

his meal the latest report lay beside the doctor's plate at table, and with all the care and knowledge he had gained from years of training and experience, he did all in his power to save the sailor.

At last no more was needed. The message came through that he was up and able to work. There was great joy on board the liner, for all were interested in that sailor. And then the two ships went on their ways to their different ports.

Probably the sailor will never meet the doctor here. But if he should, I expect he would look at him and say, "You saved my life. I don't know how to thank you." While the doctor would feel so glad he had been able to do it, because that was just what he had become a doctor for.

We are each one so like that sailor. Only some of us are not so sensible as he was. He did at once what the doctor told him. He did not argue about it or say "How can he know what I need so far away?" The sailor was far too ill for that and he knew it, and he did so want to live.

And there is One sending messages and watching each one of us so anxiously to see if we are doing what He says—One Who said, "They that are whole have no need of the physician but they that are sick: I came not to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance." Mark 2. 17.

He gave His life that we might live, and we need Him far more even than the sailor needed his doctor. We are going on to see Him face to face, but even now as we realise our need and take His message and do what He says, we can and do say to Him with all our heart, "You saved me. I don't know how to thank You." He is so glad. He says there is joy all through heaven when that happens—it was why He came here.



This I arranged and we stayed until late looking into God's Word and praying, but no relief came and again Harry left with a heavy heart. On the following Lord's Day morning Harry was seen at the back of the Meeting Room, and at the close of the meeting was asked "How is it now, Harry?" "Tis all right now. I can now say the Lord Jesus Christ is my Saviour," was his glad reply.

Harry's life was now completely changed. First of all he went to the man who held his money on a horse and told him that if he was successful he was not to bring the money to him, for he had finished with it all.

He then testified to his workmates that he had received the Lord Jesus. This brought ridicule and opposition, but through God's grace he continues witnessing, as opportunity offers, of his precious Saviour Who is mighty to save and to keep.

Dear young reader, you may be nearing the time when you feel you must leave Sunday School: let me entreat you to receive the Lord Jesus now and continue under the sound of the glorious Gospel. Thus you will be kept from many of the snares Satan is so ready to set for the feet of the young, and you will be able to rejoice in the Saviour Whom Harry found at last, and to say of a truth, "The Son of God Who loved me and gave Himself for me."

Some of God's Heroes

JUST a hundred and fifty years ago there was born in the United States a boy who was to be one of God's heroes in the Mission Field. He had godly parents who sought to train Judson, and overruled all for his blessing. The young fellow whom he chose as his friend was one who tried to persuade himself and others that there was no God, and Judson was soon won over to the same foolish ideas.

Turning his back upon all his

their boy for God. His name was Adoniram Judson. His mother taught him quite early to read the Bible. He was a thoughtful clever boy and gave promise of being a great man one day.

When sixteen years of age he went to college where, alas! he made a friendship which might have ruined not only his life here, but his soul as well. God, however, had his eye on parents had taught him he determined to enjoy life (as he thought) and joined a company of actors. One night in his travels he came to a country inn where he lodged for the night. When he retired to rest he was disturbed by the cries of despair and groans of a man who seemed to be dying. Judson could not sleep. He pictured himself on his dying bed, and although he repeated to himself all the

things his infidel friend had taught him, yet he felt afraid of death.

In the morning he heard that the man in the next room had died, and what was his horror on making further inquiries to find that the dead man was none other than his infidel friend! You can perhaps imagine the shock this was to Judson, and God used it to arouse the young man to his awful condition and to bring him to Himself through faith in Christ.

Now he was saved himself he felt he must carry the Gospel to others, and before long he set sail with his young wife for India, going on from there to Rangoon in Burma to which he felt they had been called.

They reached there in 1813, and for nearly six weary years this devoted couple laboured on without seeing any fruit from their labours. No one seemed interested in them or their message, and those in authority seemed against them.

From the beginning Judson set himself to master the language so as to be able to talk and preach to the natives in their own tongue, and also to translate the Bible into Burmese. It was a very difficult language and meant constant study, but he persevered in spite of discouragements, ill health and loneliness.

Once he set off by sea in a small trading vessel to a place called Chittagong, to find a native christian as a helper. For nearly three months the boat tossed about without reaching land. Water gave out and food was done, and for weeks Judson lived on mouldy rice badly cooked. No one

cared much for the one white man on board, and when finally the boat reached land Judson was so thin and weak that he could not move. He managed to scrawl a few lines in a note to send ashore and some Europeans who received it came to his help and nursed him back to health again. Meantime his poor wife was in Rangoon without news of her husband.

At last they were re-united and once more settled down to win souls in that needy land. They built a meeting place and there on a little platform in the middle of the building Judson would sit day after day, and hour after hour, reading God's Word aloud, in the hope that someone would hear and be saved. But the people passed Sometimes attracted by the voice they would stop for a moment, then go on unheeding. And still the man of God read on day after day, faint and weary, in the tropical heat, longing to be at his studies or doing other important duties, but anxious not to stop his reading lest in the silence someone would pass without hearing the Word.

He had the assurance of God's Word. "We shall reap if we faint not," and God blessed his labours. In May, 1819, the first native confessed his faith in Christ and was publicly baptised, and soon others followed, and it looked as if the missionaries' dark days were over and a season of joy before them.

Next month, if the Lord will, we shall learn whether this was really so and what the future held for these dear brave missionaries.

A Thoughtful Cottager.

"HAT'S the cottage. I'm sure that's the one." I was motoring with a friend through the country in Kent when he made this remark. I looked at the cottage he pointed out and then he told me that about fifty years ago, when he was a young man, he often walked along that road. As there were no buses in those days, he used to walk a long distance from where he was living to visit his grandfather.

He went on to tell me that one day as he was nearing the cottage which we had just passed, he was feeling particularly hot and thirsty, when to his surprise he noticed a table outside and on it a jug of sparkling water and a mug. It was just what he needed. How gladly he took the mug in his hand and quenched his thirst with the water!

The one who lived in that house knew the need of the weary travellers, and so he had placed the water there in reach of the passer-by. And any who cared to, could avail themselves of the refreshing draft. As soon as the jug was empty it was refilled, and many were thankful for a free drink.

Does this not remind you of another free offer announced by the Lord Jesus in John 7. 37? "If any man thirst let him come unto Me and drink." This has to do with soul thirst and the Lord Jesus is the only One Who can satisfy that thirst. He alone can give lasting joy and happiness for time and eternity.

How often we are like the little boy and think we are clever enough to go alone, but like him we are brought face to face with danger which only the Lord Jesus can save us from.



A Penny Farthing.

In these days of flying machines and motor cars it is difficult to imagine the old fashioned bicycle with iron rims and solid tyres and one big wheel and one small. They used to be called penny farthings.

It is a Sunday afternoon between sixty and seventy years ago, and along a dusty road leading from Canterbury to Margate can be seen a young fellow coming along on one of these penny farthings. He looks hot and is going fairly quickly for those days, when suddenly he stops, puts his bicycle in the hedge, and runs on.

What can he be doing? We will watch him out of sight, and I think we had better keep an eye on the bicycle so that no one steals it. After waiting for some minutes we see another young fellow running along, all the time keeping his eye on the side of the road. Up he comes to the bicycle and, taking it out of the hedge, he gets on it and away he goes. It is not long before he overtakes the first one and they call out to each other. On he goes for about half a mile when he gets off and, leaving the machine in the hedge, he starts to run on.

Can you understand what they are doing? They have fifteen miles to go, and as they only have one bicycle between them, they take it in turns, running and riding.

Why do you think they were so anxious to get to Margate? I will tell you. These two fellows both worked on a farm. They had hurried this day to get all their work done so that they might go and hear a preacher

of the Gospel make known the story of God's love. They were unsaved, but anxious to know the way of salvation, and God had His eye on them too, and directed His servant to speak just the right word for them.

They reached the Hall in time and found a good company gathered. Soon the preacher was reading the story of the prodigal son in Luke 15. It was a wonderful message to those young men, and to one of them it was a never forgotten night, for he was led to return as a guilty sinner to the God against Whom he had sinned, and trusting in the Saviour he received the knowledge of the forgiveness of sins.

What the preacher pressed that night was the joy of the father in the return of the prodigal, and he told of God's delight and joy when any sinner, young or old, just returns to Him, owning they have sinned. He spoke of how God is waiting, full of compassion, to run and welcome them, and assure them of forgiveness, just as the father assured his son he was forgiven when he covered him with kisses.

Are you in earnest about your soul? Have you ever felt you would like to be saved, yet perhaps you hardly know how it can all come about? Let me remind you that there is One above Whose heart yearns over you, and longs to assure you that He loves you. Why not just turn to Him now, owning that you have sinned? He will hear you. E saw last month how, after years of labour and privation, Mr. and Mrs. Judson rejoiced to see their first Burmese convert, and soon there were quite a few who believed the gospel and were saved. As usual in such cases, however, Satan began to stir up opposition and so worked that those in power tried to get the people to stick to their old religion and to keep away from the missionaries. At last Judson decided to pay a visit to the king who lived at Ava, a long distance from Rangoon. It was a long dangerous journey and even when there one could only with difficulty get permission to enter the king's presence. Judson succeeded in getting in, but oh! what bitter disappointment awaited him, for the king read his letter, threw the Burmese booklet Judson gave him on the floor and walked out in anger.

It was only when Judson was joined later by a missionary who was a doctor that the king became more friendly and offered him land on which to build a mission house. Judson accepted it, but no sooner had he and his wife settled down there to work in Ava than all was changed again. War broke out between Britain and Burma, and although an American, Judson was seized as a spy and thrown into a horrible prison.

For months he endured the miserable prison life, exposed to hardships and suffering. Three times he was condemned to death and yet spared, for God had more work for His servant

to do. Meantime his devoted wife suffered equal hardships outside the prison, making every effort to get her husband set free and visiting him in prison when allowed.

Their house was searched and things of value taken away. There was one thing, however, which above all was precious to them, and that was the translation of the Bible which Judson had worked on for so long. Where do you think they hid it? Judson took it to the prison, and they sewed it inside an old cushion which Mr. Judson used as a pillow. Even then they nearly lost it, for a jailor took the pillow for himself, but finding it too hard he threw it back to his prisoner. Again it was taken away and someone stole the cover off it, but in the end the Judsons got back the hard inside stuffing with its hidden treasure.

At last Judson was released from prison, but soon after his dear wife passed away, worn out with all the sufferings and anxiety she had undergone. It was some years later that Judson completed his translation of the Bible in Burmese, and commended it to God for His blessing.

We cannot now follow Judson further in his labours in Burma amongst the people he so loved and longed to win for Christ. He was much used by God in blessing to souls for many years. Here is something he said which is a message to us today! "We cannot all be missionaries but we may all be earnest Christians. We cannot all labour as earnest mis ionaries for Christ, but we may all help those who do."

Bird Messengers.

In our picture are two pigeons which, during the Great War, carried messages in France. Pigeons, too, were used in the siege of Paris. But have you ever heard of wild birds carrying messages? One of our Bible Searchers has written to us from Canada telling us a wonderful story which I am sure will interest our readers. There is a man that lives in the district she writes from who has a large bird sanctuary. That is a


place where the birds have freedom and are not shot or killed. Here thousands of birds are to be seen, ducks and

geese and wild fowl.

Now who would have thought of making these birds the carriers of messages from the Word of God? Well, that is just what is happening.

The birds are caught and tagged. A small identification tag is fixed to the leg of the bird and on it is stamped a verse of Scripture.

You may wonder what is the use of this, for the birds cannot read, but I will tell you. When the time comes for the birds to migrate, off they go and carry these messages with them. Then in the Arctic Circle and around Baffin's Land some natives go out in search of a meal. A few shots are heard and down falls a wild duck.


Have you proved this?



Well, these boys, thoroughly enjoying the adventure and not caring about the lateness of the hour, or the darkness, which was not very dense at that time of the year, climbed into the cave and began to enjoy the things they had secured for the occasion.

The lapping of the water on the rocks was most musical, and they must have been enjoying their stolen pleasure for some time when, all of a sudden, a gleam of light darted into the cave. It grew suddenly light and looking up they saw a scene which neither

of them will ever forget. The moon had peeped over the horizon and a lovely golden pathway seemed to lead from the cave right across the sea!

A Narrow Escape.


MARY lived in the historic old town of Linlithgow in which is the palace where Mary, Queen of Scots was born.

Another interesting thing we find in God's Word is the various *places* where we read of people praying. Do you know who it was that prayed standing by his camels? (See Gen. 24).



The Story of a Pillow

THERE was a time when the beautiful Islands of New Zealand and round about there, were inhabited by cannibal tribes who were constantly at war with each other.

During one of these tribal wars, an enemy chief, who was tracking down another man, found a little girl fast asleep with her head on a pillow. Was it a soft, down pillow? No, it was a little book, a St. Luke's Gospel in her own language, Maori.

It was her greatest treasure, for she had learnt to love the Lord Jesus at the Mission School. But the enemy chief knew nothing of that, and the child was cruelly murdered.

Finding the little book underneath, he carried it away and kept it as a war relic, probably thinking it was a charm of some sort. The poor stricken father of the little girl, managing to escape death, looked in vain for the Gospel afterwards. He too was a follower of Christ.

"God works in a mysterious way," for although the owner of the book had been taken Home to God, her little treasure had not yet fulfilled its mission.

Years went by. The murderer died and his son had different ideas, for he was sick at heart with the constant bloodshed. "Can there be no other way to settle quarrels?" he asked. "Yes" said a friend, "there is another way. If I had a Gospel I could show you." "A Gospel?" The young chief's memory went back to a little old tattered and shabby book which his tribe had for some reason or other carefully guarded.

He fetched it quickly. I can picture the scene, can you? The friend could evidently read. I can imagine him reading the story of One Who came to bring "Peace and Goodwill" to earth, of His blessed life and death for our sins, of His teaching, "Love ye your enemies." I can see the young chief listening intently. "No more war for me!" The tattered little Gospel had done its work. The young chief was won for Christ!

The word "pillow" is only mentioned three or four times in the Bible. It is interesting to look them up. Jacob once had a stone for a pillow (Gen. 28), but that night he had a beautiful dream, and when he awoke he knew that the everlasting arms of God had been underneath that hard pillow, and God had promised His presence with him all the way.

Then we read of the Lord Jesus, with His head on a pillow sleeping calmly through a storm, trusting absolutely in His Father's care (Mark 4).

There is another mention of "pillows" in Ezekiel 13. They were little cushions sewn on to the garment so that the elbows could be rested on them. But they were hated of God, because they represented self-indulgence and ease, which often led to sin.

Dear young friend (and older ones too), the best pillow you can rest your heart on as you go to sleep to-night, is the one the little Maori girl had—THE GOSPEL. You will know that whatever happens (and many things may!) if you are trusting in the Lord Jesus, all must be well, for

"UNDERNEATH ARE THE EVER-LASTING ARMS." Deut. 33. 27.

Was it a Dream?

I had just been reading the story of the Great Supper in Luke 14, intending to speak of it at a children's meeting which I was to address. I closed my eyes and this is what I saw.

Indeed some did go in and I thought I went in after a while. and inside there was a table laden with wonderful food—food suited to everybody, babies, young people and old folk, all were provided for. Overhead was spread a banner sparkling with

golden letters, and these letters were L.O.V.E.

Sometimes one of the guests would appear not to relish the rich provisions and would wander to the door by which he had entered. Then the Saviour, for it was He, would lovingly restrain him and gently lead him towards another door on the other side. Outside there were beautiful grass slopes, gentle streams and refreshing springs. The Saviour would lead him up and down in gentle talk till all was quiet again, and he was glad to join the happy throng within.

Gradually the numbers increased until I thought the last one entered and the door was shut. Those outside, being used to seeing it open, wondered. Some went up the steps and knocked. Then great consternation took hold of the people. They rushed from the picture palaces, amusement parks and theatres, dances and whist drives and besieged the door, only to realise the awful truth that they were TOO LATE.

Many said they had intended going in that very night, but had put it off. Now it was too late.

Well, dear children, this gave me such a desire towards that meeting of little folk, that forty or fifty rough boys and girls sat as still as mice while I told them what you have just read.

Have you gone in to let the Lord Jesus serve you with His wonderful Good Things? If not, don't put it off or perhaps you may have to cry "TOO LATE."



I hope that those who are not saved will not put off coming to Him till they are older. The Lord Jesus wants to save you now and it is not safe to delay.

In September, the senior searchers were asked to read that interesting story in II Kings about the four lepers. In many ways this reminds us of the gospel story. These men were in desperate need and they thought they must die so it was good tidings to hear of food and clothing too, in abundance. We were in even greater need than they were, for the wages of sin is death, but through the work of the Lord Jesus everlasting life is offered to us as well as much greater blessings than these things the lepers found.

Don't you think the courtier is like those who hear the gospel but who do not believe it? He might have shared the good things but instead of that he was trampled on and died. How sad it will be for those who might have been saved and are not! I trust this will not be the fate of any reader of our little book.

What is Faith?

THIS was the question which a little boy kept puzzling over, as perhaps some of you have done many times. He did want to know, and at last he was told that faith is simply believing—expecting God to do what He says He will. If we have faith in God we know He hears us when we pray and we expect Him to give us the answer.

The boy thought a good deal about this, and before very long something happened which tested his faith and taught him a lesson which he never forgot.

One day as he was going off to school his mother gave him sixpence, but on arrival at school he found that he had lost it on the way. This was a great sorrow to him and he felt he must try to find it. He thought he knew where he must have dropped it, but he could not go to look for it till school was over and by then it might be gone. He was starting to worry when he remembered what he had learned about faith and how God answers prayer, so he just asked the Lord to help him find his sixpence when school was over, and he became quite peaceful about it.

Soon however it started to snow and as he saw the large snowflakes coming down so thickly, he thought "Alas! my sixpence will be quite covered up. I shall never find it now." Such fears were just filling his mind when he again remembered that God hears and answers prayer, so he prayed once more to keep his sixpence safe and help him find it, and then he felt restful again.

As the hours went on however, the snow stopped and once more the boy's fears were aroused for he heard the sound of shovelling outside, as the snow was piled up to clear the roads. How could he ever expect to find his sixpence now? It would be impossible—but . . . and once more the truth flashed into the boy's mind—God hears and answers prayer. So he checked the fears and just prayed quietly and confidently that the Lord would still take care of his sixpence and restore it to him.

At last school was over and the boy rushed off to the spot where he expected to find the sixpence. Was he disappointed? Had God failed him? No, He knows those who trust in Him, and as the boy approached the spot there was a great pile of snow, and on the very top of it was the lost sixpence! Oh! how glad the boy was to find his precious coin; how happy too to know that God had indeed answered his prayers. He never forgot that day, nor the lesson he learned then of the power of prayer and the blessedness of trusting or putting your faith in God.

"Something More Than Gold."

It was on a lovely summer evening at a seaside town. The air was warm and still, and many people were walking up and down the sea front where a few christians were having an open-air Gospel Meeting. Some of them had formed a ring, and one speaker and another had been telling out to those who passed by

the wonderful story of Jesus and His love. One or two others were standing on the sidepath handing out tracts to those who passed on without stopping. One of the workers had just about come to the end of his supply of tracts, and having just two left stepped up to two young men who stood talking near by, saying to them "Will you take these? They are my last two." The young men looked for a moment, and then with a smile said "Oh, please give them to someone else."

Now why did they say that? They were not asked to pay for the tracts. The story that was in them was the sweet gospel of God; yet they said "Give them to someone else." I wonder now, if those two little books had been one pound notes, what they would have said. What would you say, if anyone asked you to take, say, a one pound note? I expect you would gladly receive it and say "Oh, thanks ever so much." You certainly wouldn't say "Give it to someone else."

I'm afraid the reason is that they were not interested. And yet the message of those tracts was the most wonderful story that the world has ever known. If those young men only knew it, there was offered to them the news of God's salvation, through the death of the Lord Jesus Christ, "that through Him is preached the forgiveness of sins." But they were not interested. And this salvation is the most valuable and the most costly thing you can even think of. It is the most costly because it cost the Lord Jesus all the

suffering and death of the cross to obtain it for us. It is the most valuable because it affects our souls, which must live on and on even after our bodies die. We sing sometimes:—

"Were the vast world our own
With all its varied store,
And Thou, Lord Jesus, wert unknown,
We still were poor."

Now, you boys and girls who read this, what about you? Do you like to hear of God's wonderful love in giving Jesus to die for you? Or are you like these two young men-not interested? There are so many people even including boys and girls, I am afraid-who are so careful and earnest about everyday things, but never think about their sins, or their souls. Perhaps however you are not like that, or else you would not be reading this little book: you would have said "Oh, give it to someone else." Then may you turn to God's book that He has given to us—the Bible—and see what He has to say to us. Here are four verses which I call the Gospel A, B, C. See if you can find them.

All have sinned. Rom. chap. 3, v. Be sure your sin will find you out. Numbers chap. 32, v. Christ died for our sins. 1 Cor. chap. 15, v. Dost thou believe on the Son of God? John chap. 9. v.

If you can truly answer "yes" to the last verse, you will be able to say that you are saved, and that your sins are all forgiven for His Name's sake. Do you know this chorus?

"Oh, yes, my friends there's something more, Something more than gold! To know your sins are all forgiven Is something more than gold."

Gas Masks.

ANY of our readers, I expect, remember the anxious time we passed through the last week of September, when war seemed to be inevitable in a few days' time.

Well, I was in a town where notices were posted up that gas masks would be given to everyone who came for them at certain halls in the district.

I was at one of these halls and my duty was to see that those who came received the right size and were properly fitted, as you see being done in our picture. As I was doing this, these gas masks seemed to speak to me of the salvation which God offers freely to everyone through our Lord Jesus.

What were they for? Protection from a threatened danger! Yes, a danger from gas bombs was feared, and so these were provided to meet that need. A danger of judgment to come threatens everyone, and God has provided a salvation in Jesus, for we read, "Neither is there salvation in any other, for there is none other name under heaven, given among men, whereby we must be saved." Acts 4.12.

What did they cost? Something like five million pounds was the amount paid by the Government for all these gas masks. It was a great cost, but it is nothing compared to the infinite price at which salvation has been obtained. It cost God the giving up of



His Son, and it cost the Lord Jesus all the sufferings of Calvary that your soul and mine might be saved. Have you ever thought of this?

To whom were they offered? To

everyone, rich and poor, old and young. There were sizes to fit all who came. Does not this remind you to whom this wonderful salvation procured by the Lord Jesus is offered? It is offered to you. It is offered to all. "To you is the word of this salvation sent."

How were they obtained? Free, for the asking, or for the taking. people flocked to receive them. Each person who came had one fitted, and took it away. One old lady turned to me and asked "Is there anything to pay?" I was able to say "No! It is free," and gladly she accepted it. So it is with the salvation that God offers. It is free! You accept it as a gift, and it is just suited to your case. Another thing, they were received individually. Each received it for him or herself. There were old men and women, middle-aged and young people, and little children, each received one to fit them. Is it not the same with God's salvation? I cannot receive it for you, but each must take it for himself. God is offering it now.

How was the offer received? Most accepted it gladly. Many were in thorough earnest to see that they were provided with this protection from gas. But some refused it. I know of more than one person who would not accept this protection, while others intended to be fitted out but put it off. How like this is to those who hear of God's offer of salvation through faith

in the Lord Jesus. Some gladly accept it. I have. Have you? Some refuse it. They despise God's grace, while others intend to be saved, but continually put it off. I hope my reader is not one of these, for the Scripture says, "How shall we escape if we neglect so great salvation?"

I was visiting a hospital where an old christian gentleman was lying dangerously ill after an operation. I shall always remember his calm face. Throughout a long life he had been very free from sickness and pain, and now the Lord Jesus was helping him to bear his suffering patiently, as He has promised, "I will never leave you." This dear old man turned feebly towards me as I sat down at his bedside, and said "I cannot read or pray or even think much of Jesus."

"Never mind," I replied, "that is why we have such a High Priest in heaven. He knows just how you are and what is in your heart." Then after a short interval I added "You can just ask Him to help you, can you not?"

In a wonderfully strong clear voice which rang through the huge ward, he cried out "Lord, help me." It reminded me of Peter, when he tried to walk on the water to go to Jesus. You remember how the Lord Jesus put out His hand and helped Peter.

In a bed opposite the christian there lay a man who was suffering from dreadful diseases, and when the pain attacked him his language was terrible.

Nurses were worn out with trying to do something to please him. He grumbled and swore at them all.

I walked across the ward to try and help him to lie more comfortably, and to my surprise he said "Ah! I wish I was like that dear old gentleman over there." I could only tell him that there is but one Saviour—the Same yesterday, and today, and forever, and one Name whereby we must be saved, the Name of Jesus.

Later the usual christian visitor came in. I asked him to see what he could do for this poor fellow. But he shook his head sadly, saying, "He will not let me speak or pray with him." You try once more," I urged, and he went.

Soon he came back, his face beaming, and whispered to me, "He even asked me to pray." We both looked to the One Who alone can save, to save this poor man before he died.

Well, when the pain returned later, do you know what he said? "Lord, help me." Now the Word of God says, "Whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved." Rom. 10. 13.

Nurses and doctors were amazed at the change in their patient. He became peaceful, and grateful for all they did for him, and although he still suffered a great deal, I am sure that the Lord Jesus helped him too, for he gave no bother any more, and died peacefully a few days later.

The old christian gentleman was too ill to be told what a change his cry had wrought in the other patient, and a week later he went to be with the Saviour he had known so long. I am sure that they are both together with their precious Saviour and will spend eternity with Him. Will you, dear boy or girl, be there too? Can you sing truly,
