The Lord did not bear the judgment of a nature, but the "judgment due to individuals. All those whose judgment He bore "will undoubtedly be saved. It will be joy, indeed, when we are for "ever freed from the presence of sin within us—the Old Man. It "would subvert Christianity to teach that the old nature has been "atoned for."—C. E. S.

Extract from "Either in Adam or in Christ" (pages 29-32), by Mr Darby.

"But we may now see what, in the substance and purpose of it, "was the import of the Cross. As regards the previous Adam state "and its fruits. it was, by the deep and blessed work of atonement, the total putting away of all guilt for the believer, all "the fruits of the old nature were blotted out and effaced-gone out " of God's sight. But there was the tree as well as the "fruit, the evil will, the lawlessness of nature Jew or Gentile, by "nature the children of wrath. But Christ has died a sacrifice for "sin. 'What the law could not do in that it was weak through the "flesh, God, sending His own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and "for sin [a sacrifice for sin, peri hamartias] condemned sin in the "flesh.' Sin in the flesh, the principle of evil working and producing "sin in us, is condemned. I do not say sins are, but sin; but it is "condemned when a sacrifice was made for it. . . . It is not "forgiven; we doubtless are as to it. An evil principle cannot properly be forgiven; it is condemned, but put away judicially by "atonement in the sight of God by Christ's sacrifice. All that con-"stituted the Old Man in God's sight is part away wholly in Christ's "death, and that judicially by a work which has glorified God as to "it; it was what became Him. Thus far God has been glorified by "Christ's perfect personal obedience as man, and by His work in "atonement for sin."—J. N. D.
